Making the region a greater place to live

This publication summarises Greater Wellington's Annual Report 2007, which reports on the achievements of the 2006/07 Annual Plan (the first year of our **Ten-Year Plan** 2006–16). Our vision remains for a "sustainable region", which means ensuring our environment is protected while meeting the economic, cultural and social needs of the community

This Year In Review highlights some of Greater Wellington's achievements in each of our activities – environment, transport, water supply, parks, land management, safety and flood protection, and community. It also contains information about our financial performance over the 2006/07 financial year.

Greater Wellington's work helps make the region a greater place to live. The impact of our programmes are all around us, be it when catching a bus or train, visiting a regional park, sailing in our harbours, drinking a glass of water, walking by a river, saving our emergency water supplies or walking in our native bush.

A busy year

Greater Wellington has had a busy year. We've laid the foundations for some significant pieces of work that will have a big impact on the region's environmental, economic, social and cultural future. Specifically, these include work on public transport, flood protection, the environment and the Wellington Regional Strategy (which is a sustainable economic growth strategy for the region).

For example, we showed our commitment to upgrading the region's public transport by launching new carriages on the Wairarapa Line, and securing the future of trolley buses with the signing of a new long-term contract that will completely replace all 61 trolley buses.

We also involved more than a 100 businesses in environment and waste-management programmes through Take Charge (our business education programme), and the Get Sustainable Challenge and EnviroSmart programmes.

Financially, Greater Wellington's results reflect a considered approach by councillors, senior management and staff. Our Chief Executive has delivered on the Council's expectations and continued efficiencies are being made across our operational activities.

Greater Wellington – Year In Review

What does Greater Wellington do?

Greater Wellington looks after the region's:

Emergency management

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Coordinates the region's Civil Defence Emergency Management Group to minimise the potential effects of emergencies, such as floods and earthquakes.

Environmental sustainability

Manages our key natural resources in the region – water, soil, air and the coast. Operates a 24-hour pollution-response service. Works with schools, business and the community to look after and restore the environment.

Flood protection

Helps communities protect themselves from the effects of flooding.

Harbour safety

Looks after the navigational safety of all vessels in Wellington and Porirua harbours, and around the regional coastline.

Land management

Works with landowners to prevent or reduce soil erosion by improving the way the land is used.

Transport

Coordinates the Metlink public transport network for the region, and funds bus, train and harbour ferry services. Plans the strategic development of the region's land transport network.

Pest control

Works with landowners to target pest plants and animals, and eradicate bovine Tb.

Regional parks and forests

Maintains a network of regional parks and forests that are enjoyed by thousands of people every year.

Water supply to reservoirs

Delivers high-quality treated water to the main reservoirs in our four cities, where each city council supplies it to homes and businesses.

Sustainable economic growth

In cooperation with the region's nine local councils, coordinates the Wellington Regional Strategy for sustainable economic growth, such as funding a regional economic development agency.



Fast facts

The region covers a land area of 813,005ha and a maritime area of 786,700ha. There is 497km of coastline.

- The population of the region is 464,700 (Statistics NZ, estimated resident population, June 2006)
- Greater Wellington manages 320km of river channels and 280km of stopbanks. We are responsible for one of the largest flood protection schemes in New Zealand
- 34,127,115 passenger journeys were made on the region's public transport system in the past year
- Greater Wellington collects, treats and delivers about 155 million litres of highquality water each day to the Wellington, Hutt, Upper Hutt and Porirua city councils
- Greater Wellington manages 50,000ha of regional parks and forests

Healthy environment

- Supported the covenanting of one wetland. A total of 32 wetlands in the region are now legally protected
- Committed to protect 189 hectares of predominantly lowland forest. 190 native forest areas are now legally protected as a result of Greater Wellington's support
 - Improved the control and monitoring systems for our water supply operations, resulting in less chemicals being used for water treatment
- Improved the health of the ecosystems on Greater Wellington land
- Achieved a 19% reduction in reported pollution incidents
- Reviewed the Regional Policy Statement in consultation with a wide range of stakeholders
- Completed a draft Stormwater Plan of Action in conjunction with city and district councils
- Undertook pest control in 78 key native ecosystem sites
- Completed riparian planting and fencing programmes along 3.7km of stream banks
- Completed the annual report cards showing the state of the region's key resources namely groundwater, rainfall and river flows, harbours, estuaries and beaches, rivers and lakes, recreational water quality, soil health and air quality
- Involved more than a 100 businesses in environment and waste-management programmes through Take Charge (our business education programme), and the Get Sustainable Challenge and EnviroSmart programmes

Quality lifestyle

- Achieved a 90% satisfaction rate from the 51% of the regional population who visited at least one regional park
- Rebuilt the Orange Hut in the Akatarawa Forest with community assistance after fire damage
- Progressed the governance structure for Whitireia Park and the Wairarapa Wetlands Park
- Continued to review our park management plans

Greater Wellington – Year In Review

Summary financial report

Income statement

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- Greater Wellington's income is in line with budget, though income from grants, rates and the water levy is up on 2006
- Increases in grant and rate income were largely due to rises in the diesel price impacting on Greater Wellington's bus contracts. This increase also impacted on operating expenditure
- The delay in signing the contract for the new Electric Multiple Units reduced the budgeted surplus. In addition, the accounting treatment for the purchase of the new Wairarapa carriages has also impacted upon the results

Council income

This graph shows Greater Wellington's income sources. Rates make up just 38% of our income total, with grants making up the next largest share. Central government grants to assist the funding of public transport make up the majority of this.

Council expenditure

This graph shows where our expenditure occurs. In the coming years, the proportion of both income and expenditure on regional transport will increase.



Greater Wellington looks after many important community assets. Our asset base consists of regional water supply, regional parks and forests, flood protection and increasingly public transport.

The Group numbers include \$19.8 million of capital expenditure which was spent by Greater Wellington Rail Limited (a Council subsidiary) by year-end for the purchase of the new Wairarapa carriages.

Balance sheet

- The increase in non-current assets is largely due to the higher valuation of our flood protection assets and investment properties. These gains have also resulted in an increase in equity
- The rise in current liabilities is a result of Greater Wellington funding some of its debt requirements from commercial paper. As a result of this, noncurrent liabilities have decreased
